Arphaxad was born 2 years after the flood. Terah had to be not 70 but 130 when he had Abram.
We can calculate from archaeological information that Abram was born about 2166 B.C. on our calendar. By this calculation, world history would be $2010+2166+2015$, or 6191 years so far up to Winter 2015.

As a caveat to this, many scholars say that the genealogies were probably summaries, with some showing grandfather-grandson and not strictly father-son relationships. Given that, all we can say is that at least 2085 years of history happened up to the death of Terah, but it is probably somewhat more. I believe the genealogies are chrono-genealogies and do give us good chronological information.

It is interesting that both of these lists are basically 10 generations long.
These dates could be checked further with the date of the Exodus (1445 B.C.) and the length of captivity in Egypt.
